The Federal Government

- Largest employer of PAs
- Establishes payment and coverage rules for health programs, including Medicare and Medicaid (covering 90 million people)
- Responsible for addressing national priorities or crises such as a pandemic or addressing the mental health and opioid overdose crisis.



What the Federal Government Does Not Do

- States are responsible for regulating "the practice of medicine"
- States regulate health professions and scope of practice

Recent AAPA Legislative Successes

- Enactment of legislation authorizing PAs to receive Direct Medicare Payment
- Enactment of RAISE Act raising federal salary caps on PAs Practicing at the Veterans Health Administration
- Enactment of Legislation Authorizing PAs to order home healthcare services for Medicare Patients
- Enactment of competitive pay legislation for PAs working at the Department of Veterans Affairs
- Elimination of the federal requirement to obtain a DATA Waiver for PAs to prescribe MAT to patients with OUD
- Enactment of legislation authorizing PAs to serve as "attending physicians" for hospice patients





Top AAPA Legislative Priorities 2023

- Improving Access to Workers' Compensation for Injured Federal Workers Act (S. 131/H.R. 618)
- Promoting Access to Diabetic Shoes Act (S. 260/HR 704)
- Increasing Access to Quality Cardiac Rehabilitation
 Care Act
- ACO Assignment Improvement Act

Look Ahead

- Showdown over federal spending
- Long-term desire to increase solvency of the Medicare Program
- Desire for more transparency and competition
- Bipartisan support for legislation to address mental health and overdose crises
- Effort to address healthcare workforce shortage



Top AAPA Federal Agency Priorities

Federal Health Programs (Medicare and Medicaid)

 AAPA Reimbursement Team and Federal Advocacy work to remove barriers within federal health coverage programs

PAs in Federal Service

- Work to maximize the ability of patients to receive quality, affordable health care provided by PA at federal health facilities, and remove Agency practices that hinder PA recruitment, retention, and practice environment
- Work with PAs in Federal Service and Federal Agencies to Modernize PA practice to align with Optimal Team Practice

- Isn't that why I pay AAPA/CO dues to advocate for me?




The Big 3: Why PAs Must be Advocates

- Visit legislator in their district office
- Attend a town hall meeting (ID yourself as a PA)
- Host a site tour of your facility/practice/program
- Share article highlighting local PAs with legislator's office (write it yourself if you have to!)
- Invite legislator to attend PA Week activities
- Friend on Facebook or Twitter; make productive/positive comments

Cindy Axne visits Redfield Medical Clinic

Congresswoman Cindy Axne, the first woman to represent Iowa's 3rd. US Congressional District, recently conducted a fact finding visit at the Redfield Medical Clinic. She is committed to keeping medical care in small towns like Redfield (pop. 835) where the PA run federally certified Redfield Rural Health Clinic is the only source of medical care in the town.

Already, she is working on modernizing the Rural Health Clinics (RHC) Act to make medical care more available by allowing advanced practice clinicians like PAs who often staff small town clinics like Redfield to practice at the top of their license and ensure fair reimbursement for free standing Rural Health Clinics.

Habits of Successful Advocates

- Meet with decision makers in-person
- Touch base often (mail, email, fax, phone)
- Offer to be a resource at home in the district
- Provide meaningful follow-up
- Give examples, anecdotes, stories
- Identify (and use) commonalities
