The airspace above Bahrain, Iraq, Kuwait, Oman, Qatar, Saudi Arabia, and U.A.E is also included (3, 4).



What were you exposed to? Trichloroethylene (TCE) to clean circuit boards.

Where and when was the location of the exposure? Korea, 1975-1985

How long was the exposure? 10 years

Routes of exposure - oral, dermal, inhaled, mucosal? Dermal, inhaled

Were precautions taken? No precautions

What are your concerns about the exposure? Tremors





Trichloroethylene (TCE) (9)

TCE was used as a powerful degreaser for machinery parts and equipment

TCE has neurotoxic and carcinogenic effects





The PACT Act

The PACT Act (10)

- Expands care for Veterans of the Vietnam, Gulf War, and post-9/11 eras
- Adds 20+ presumptive conditions for burn pits, Agent Orange, etc.
- Adds presumptive-exposure locations for Agent Orange and radiation
- Requires VA to provide a toxic exposure screening to every Veteran
- Increases research, education, and treatment related to toxic exposures





Examples of Toxic Exposures

- Burn Pits
- Herbicide Agent 2,3,7,8 Tetrachlorodibenzodioxin (TCDD), Agent Orange
- Asbestos
- Mustard Gas Nitrogen, Sulfur Mustard, or Lewisite
- Camp Lejeune Water Contamination
- Gulf War Illness in Southwest Asia
- Gulf War Illnesses in Afghanistan
- Radiation

Routes of exposure - oral, dermal, inhaled, mucosal? Inhaled

Were precautions taken? No precautions

What are your concerns? Chronic rhinitis and asthma

History

What were you exposed to? Agent Orange

Where and when was the location of the exposure? Vietnam, 1966-1969

How long was the exposure? 3 years

Routes of exposure - oral, dermal, inhaled, mucosal? Dermal, inhaled, oral

Were precautions taken? No precautions

Concerns: DM Type 2, neuropathy, hypothyroidism, HTN, prostate cancer





Agent Orange (11, 12)

Blend of tactical herbicides

Sprayed from 1962 to 1971 in the Vietnam war to remove trees and foliage.

The carcinogen "dioxin" or TCDD is a byproduct of herbicide production.

Implementing Environmental Exposure Informed Care

Asking About Military Service Is Key

In addition to asking about toxic exposures and injuries, don't forget to ask about emotional responses related to military service such as PTSD, depression, suicidal ideation, and homicidal ideation.







Key Questions To Ask Regarding Exposures (6)

- May I ask about environmental factors during your service?
- What were you exposed to?
- Where and when were you exposed?
- How long was the exposure?
- What precautions were taken?
- What are your concerns about the exposure(s)?

- 2. Veteran benefits have expanded under the PACT Act.
- 3. Use resources such as the Exposure Ed Mobile App to learn more.
- 4. Refer Veterans to Environmental Health Registry Evaluations.
- 5. Direct Veterans to the VA for their disability claim.
